Why Full SBB?

 Offering Humanities subjects at more demanding level or less demanding level to students when they are in Sec 2.







- In order to create more opportunities for students of different backgrounds and academic courses to learn and engage with each other,
 - We organise mixed form classes to ensure a **good mix of student profiles**.
 - Every class will be assigned a House.
- This enables students from different backgrounds to build meaningful friendships and learn to value different perspectives.

- Students in the same form class will learn a common curriculum for six subjects comprising around 1/3 of curriculum time:
 - Art
 - Character & Citizenship Education (CCE)
 - Design & Technology (D&T)
 - Food & Consumer Education (FCE)
 - Music
 - Physical Education (PE)
- For other subjects (English Language, Humanities, Mathematics, Mother Tongue Languages and Science), students will attend classes with others taking the subject at the same subject level (G3/G2/G1).





Common Curriculum Subjects

Common Curriculum Subjects

Examinable Subjects:

- Art
- Design & Technology (D&T)
- Food and Consumer Education (FCE)

Non-examinable Subjects:

- Character & Citizenship Education (CCE)
- Music
- Physical Education (PE)

The six common curriculum subjects would each have a single syllabus for all students at Lower Secondary levels.

- Content and learning outcomes of these subjects are taught at a common level that is accessible by all students.
- Teachers adopt a range of approaches to teach the subjects catering to the different learning needs of their students.
- Students will learn the basics of the subjects from Secondary One and deepen their learning over the two years. They will also have opportunities to learn from different tasks and assignments tailored to their learning progress.





Subject-Based Banding (SBB) Provisions

(A) Eligibility of students to offer subject(s) at a more demanding level at the start of Sec 1



For English Language, Mother Tongue Languages, Mathematics and/or Science, students can offer them at the start of Secondary 1 at a more demanding level if they meet the eligibility criteria.

Eligibility criteria for English Language, Mathematics, Science, Mother Tongue Languages

PG2	AL 5 or better	-	G3
PG1	AL 5 or better	-	G2 / G3
PGI	AL 6	AL A	G2

Eligibility criteria for <u>Higher Mother</u> <u>Tongue Languages</u>

(from 2026 Sec 1 cohort onwards)

AL 1/AL 2 in Mother Tongue Language;

or

Distinction/Merit in Higher Mother

Tongue Language



 Students can offer Humanities subjects at a more demanding level from Secondary 2 onwards, based on their results in Secondary 1.





Subject-Based Banding (SBB) Provisions

(B) Eligible students may offer some subjects at a less demanding level from Secondary 1. Students who offer subjects at a less demanding level may subsequently offer the subject at a more demanding level as they gain greater competence and confidence in the subject.







Subject-Based Banding (SBB) Provisions

(B) Students can offer to take subjects at a less demanding level based on the following considerations:

Subject-Based Banding (SBB) Provisions

Subject Level Flexibility Throughout Secondary Education

Beyond the start of Secondary 1, students may adjust their subject levels across their secondary school journey.

• E.g. Students can also offer English Language, Mathematics, Science and/or Mother Tongue Languages at a more demanding level from Secondary 1 Semester 2.







Subject Level Flexibility Throughout Secondary Education

o Eligibility criteria to take subjects at a **more demanding level**, <u>from Sec 1 Semester 2:</u>

English Language, Mathematics, Science, Mother Tongue Languages				
Current subject level School-based results		Option to offer subject at		
G1	≥75% in the specific subject	G2 starting from next semester		
G2	≥75% in the specific subject	G3 starting from next semester		



Progression to Secondary 2

- All students will generally progress to Secondary 2.
 - Teachers will check in with students and parents to discuss the subjects and respective subject levels that best suit the student.
 - Students can offer certain subjects at a more demanding level based on his/her interest and learning progress.

Upper secondary

Deciding on upper secondary subject combinations

All students will offer between 5 and 9 examinable subjects for upper secondary.

Students will continue to have flexibility to offer subjects at different subject levels, including elective subjects (e.g. Additional Mathematics, Art, Design & Technology).

Secondary 3 & 4

Opting into FSBB

- If your child/ward meets the eligibility criteria for the subjects (ie. EL, MTL, MATH, SCI) at the more demanding level, he/she will be offered the subject(s) at the more demanding level. You and your child will be informed of the offer via Parents Gateway.
- Please indicate the acceptance of the offered subject(s) that your child/ward wishes to take (or not to take) at the more demanding level via Parents Gateway by 26 December 2025.
